Existing Key Issues



View looking along Shore Road

- Narrow footpaths
- Bollards clutter the environment and impede pedestrian movement
- Lack of designated crossing points
- Speed of traffic along Shore Road
- Lack of well integrated cycle infrastructure
- Lack of seating and well integrated signage
- Too many cars traveling down Shore Road unnecessarily



Traffic and large numbers of parked cars impede pedestrian movement

- Traffic contributes to a noisy, congested environment
- Lack of designated crossing points
- Limited pedestrian only space for events and gatherings
- Lack of well integrated signage
- Vacant building plots

A Vision for Strandhill - Overarching Design Considerations




Key Public Realm Design Considerations

- Reduce traffic speeds along Shore Road
- Create a sense of arrival
- Provide clear signage on car parking and traffic speeds
- Reduce the number of cars on the Shore Front
- Consider a seasonal approach (high season March to September)
- Increase the width of the promenade and improve facilities
- Create civic spaces along the Shore Front
- Consider a shared surface along Shore Road and the Shore Front, with pedestrian priority
- Introduce 'Viewing Shelters'
- Enhance links to wider coastal connections
- Maintain emergency access to the Shore Front at all times
- Maintain cycle access to the Shore Front at all times and provide cycle parking
- Reconfigure the existing council car park with the aim of increasing the number of spaces and examine the possibility of introducing SUDS
- Create off road walkway to Shore Front from the Council Car Park




Strandhill Public Realm Enhancement Project Summary of the public consultation carried out so far



Option 1 retain some car parking and improve public space


Only 20% respondents supported this option



Option 2 -

seasonal access = no access during summer months with reduce car parking on Shore Front during winter months.

41% of respondents supported this option but wanted access for 'blue badge' holders all year around



Option 3 -Complete Pedestrianisation of Shore Road and Shore Front

56% of respondents preferred this option.

- Maintaining access to designated disabled drivers at the same time as restricting access to the Shore Front on a seasonal basis is not easily achievable.
- Complete pedestrianisation while maintaining access to residents and businesses is achievable but could be seen as too restrictive, particularly for those with mobility issues.
- A compromise solution is to only provide disabled and age friendly spaces on the Shore front all year round and increase the number of spaces in the main Council Car Park on Shore Road.
- With reduced traffic on Shore Road as a result of less car parking on the Shore Front, footpaths can be widened and the walk down to the sea front enhanced and made safer and more accessible for all.



Following on from feedback received to date, we have set out three possible options for this part of Strandhill - (1) a do nothing option, (2) a full pedestrianisation of Shore Road and the Shore Front with significant public realm improvements and no car parking on the Shore Front or (3) transformation of the Shore Front into a child friendly, safe and sociable space with limited parking spaces for designated disabled permit holders and older persons (age friendly).

Option 1 - no intervention



All year round

- All traffic allowed access along Shore Road and the Shore Front, as existing
- Car parking provision as existing along the Shore Front
- No public realm interventions

Option 2 -Full pedestrianisation of Shore Road and Shore Front - no vehicle access year round other than for property owners and deliveries



All year round

- Residents and service vehicles allowed access monitored by a key fob/ barrier system
- No other vehicle access/ car parking
- Emergency vehicle access

- Vastly improved Shore Front which will become a true shared space
- Vehicles allowed for delivery only
- Public realm improvements to Shore Road







Option 3 -

Enhanced pedestrian friendly space along the Shore Front with restricted vehicle access / parking



All year round

- Narrowed one-way entrance onto Shore Road with enhanced public realm and widened pedestrian footpaths
- Enhanced Shore Front which will become a pedestrian friendly promenade space focused on the movement of people
- Layby / drop off space for refuse and service vehicles
- Retention of circa 20 car parking spaces 10 designated disabled spaces and 10 age friendly spaces
- Increased parking spaces within the existing council car park
- Emergency vehicle access





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
